- Overview of conference: Dean Judy Nichols Mitchell (WSU). Dean Mitchell overviewed the CADREI conference events making a few changes in the schedule (e.g., Dr. Sharon Robinson cannot attend due to illness)
- The New AACTE: Evidence Based Preparation, Pedagogy and Performance. – Dr. M. Christopher Brown II VP Research and Policy; AACTE. Dr. Brown outlined the new strategic directions of AACTE including an aligned research foci. The annual AACTE meeting will launch publicly many of the new strategies.
- Government Relations Report. Deans Susan Fowler (U. Illinois, Urbana-Champaign), Vi Florez (U New Mexico), Les Sternberg (U South Carolina), Dr. Chris Brown (VP AACTE). Report on HEA, state advocacy, direct advocacy by AACTE, and DC advocacy by deans. See associated handouts. Time sensitivity, impartial information on controversial issues, relationship building with staff, organization of state deans.
- The David Imig Annual Lecture: Dr. Robert Floden (Michigan State University). Reviewing the Research on Teacher Education. The AERA Perspective: Studying Teacher Education: The Report of the AERA Panel on Research and Teacher Education; edited by Marilyn Cochran-Smith and Kenneth M. Zeichner. Focus on the outcomes associated with TE. The National Academy of Education Perspective; Preparing Teachers for a Changing World; edited by Linda Darling-Hammond and John Bransford. 2005. focus on knowledge bases for teaching to suggest what should be in TE curricula
- Discussion of AERA and NAE Books: Jim Cibulka and Robert Floden. Dean Cibulka (U. of Kentucky) described the outcomes of recent work from the Research Committee of AACTE. Biggest source of resources for educational research is the state money associated with faculty research time. How to create collaborations to make use of this resource? AERA and AACTE connections? How to involve faculty? Conversations with content professional organizations? Only high quality research should appear at AERA and AACTE. Division K. What is the short list of high leverage

research questions? Clinical practice? TNE models? Professional vs. Graduate Schools? Conversations about identity as doctoral degree granting institutions are needed in future meetings?

Teacher Preparation Programs in the United State: An NRC Study. Michael B. Allen, Ph. D. (NRC, Study Director). Operational arm for studies by the National Academy of Sciences. Congressional questions: 1. Who enters TE; what is their academic prep and ed background; 2. what type of instruction and experiences do they receive, who delivers it, how much commonality in content and experiences, with deep focus on reading, science, and mathematics. 3. To what extent are required course work and exp in reading (and math?) across teacher prep consistent with converging scientific evidence? 4. What model for data collection would provide valid and reliable info about the content knowledge, pedagogical competence, and graduates from the various kinds of teach prep programs? Institute of Education Sciences: An Update. Dr. Barbara Foorman, Commissioner of Education Research. Standing review panels and predictable submission dates have been established. The amount of research money available will be approximately \$140M from the National Center for Education Research (Teaching and Learning Division and Systems and Policy Division) and \$7M in the Center for Special Education Research. There are additional resources in the Dept. of Ed. Evaluation Center (Phoebe Cottingham).

National Science Foundation. Dr. Donald Thompson, Acting Assistant Director, Directorate of Education and Human Resources. Every directorate has an education section. How do we transmit science to new Americans? NSF = \$5.6B. EHR is largest directorate. COE deans must be more aggressive in pushing the agenda of building a nation of scientists, engineers, and science literate citizens.
