


- Self portraits using mirrors as a guide

- Writing to a pen pal




Book Selections

Teachers at A. Sophie Rogers School for Early Learning value diversity and are committed to classroom experiences which highlight diverse backgrounds and cultures. While devising weekly curriculum and planning projects, consideration is given to how the lesson will be experienced by all learners, who is reflected in the lesson materials, how to individualize instruction and how to incorporate feedback from each child into activity extension and improvement.

Teachers all around the world work with students from diverse backgrounds whether it is capabilities, culture, socio-economic status, religion among many others. My personal experience with diversity in the classroom starts with a young toddler exploring baby dolls in the dramatic play area. We had baby dolls from different races for the children to use. I picked a Caucasian baby with a lighter skin tone. The toddler noticed it and ran to bring me an Asian baby with my dark skin tone and said, "Miss Dilshad this is your baby, she looks like you!" The child realized that my skin tone is different from hers just like the baby dolls. We had pictures of our families posted on our classroom walls along with people from different ethnicities and cultures for promoting diversity amongst our community. The toddler pointed to an Indian picture of a woman that looked like me. We talked about where I'm from and why I look different.
